Online applications for registration open soon for final year students

Students of Chinese medicine can go online soon to apply for registration as a health practitioner but must be final year graduates of a program of study approved by the Chinese Medicine Board of Australia (the National Board).

An online graduate registration service for final year students was launched by the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA) in May 2011.

The service enables students to apply for registration early before completing their course and aims to smooth the path from study to work in five simple steps.

Online graduate applications for registration as a Chinese medicine practitioner will open in mid-October, however hard copy applications can be made now. All applications require students to return some supporting documents to AHPRA by mail.

Board Chair, Professor Charlie Xue, said students must select the division or divisions of the profession in which they will practise when making an application for general registration as a Chinese medicine practitioner.

The divisions of registration are: acupuncture, Chinese herbal medicine and Chinese herbal dispensing.

'To be a registered Chinese medicine practitioner a graduate of an approved program of study must also meet the National Board's registration requirements,' Professor Xue said.

New graduate registration standards relate to:

- criminal history,
- English language skills, and
- professional indemnity insurance.

'Graduates need to be a registered health practitioner before they can start practising and are urged to go online and apply for registration four to six weeks before completing their course,' Professor Xue said.

'Graduates are encouraged to read the information available at <u>www.ahpra.gov.au</u> under <u>Graduate</u> <u>Applications</u> in preparation for when online applications open in mid-October.'

There are five simple steps to graduate registration:

- 1. Students apply for registration 4 to 6 weeks before completing their course at http://www.ahpra.gov.au/Registration/Graduate-Applications.aspx
- 2. Applicants fill out an online application (if eligible) or download an application form. All applications require some documents to be sent to AHPRA by mail.
- 3. Education providers advise AHPRA when applicants are eligible to graduate
- 4. AHPRA finalises assessment, confirms registration, publishes new graduates' names on the Register of Practitioners and sends out registration certificates
- 5. New graduates registered with their profession's National Board are eligible to start working as soon as their name is published on the Register of Practitioners
