

Communiqué

22 March 2016

The 52nd meeting of the Chinese Medicine Board of Australia (the Board) was held on 22 March 2016 in Melbourne.

This communiqué provides key decisions made at the meeting. It is also published on the Board's <u>website</u> and an announcement via email is sent to a broad range of stakeholders. Please forward the communiqué to colleagues who may be interested in the work of the Board.

Local data summaries from a National Scheme

The National Boards and AHPRA have published <u>reports for each state and territory</u> on the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme (the National Scheme).

The reports provide a unique insight on local outcomes within a scheme for which the core focus is protection of the public. They are for the 2014/15 year of the scheme.

The summaries provide local data on registration types, notifications (complaints) and mandatory notifications for the regulated health professions, for each state and territory.

National awareness campaign

You may have seen the start of the AHPRA national awareness campaign. **Know your obligations**, the first of three phases, directed at employers of health practitioners, launched at the close of last year. The message has been shared over social media through targeted ads resulting in a doubling of our online community.

The next phase of the campaign is targeted at practitioners. Under the headline of **The not-so-small print**, practitioners are encouraged to stay up to date with regulation changes as they occur, and to be aware of their obligations as registered practitioners. Advertisements will be rolled out later this month across a mix of social media, industry publications and newsletters.

The final phase will be directed at the public to increase awareness of the national register of practitioners.

Approved programs of study

At the end of June 2015, the grandparenting provisions of the National Law expired. Importantly, that means unless you were previously registered under another law, in order to register now, you must hold a qualification from an approved program of study.

Approved programs of study are published in the *Education* section on <u>AHPRA's website</u> after they have been accredited and approved by the Board.

The list of accredited programs will soon be published in the Accreditation section on the Board's website.

English language skills registration standard

The Board would like to remind all new applicants and practitioners to be familiar with the *English language skills registration standard* that came in to effect from 1 July 2015.

Call for applications – Chinese Medicine Accreditation Committee

The Chinese Medicine Board of Australia (the Board) seeks applications from suitably qualified and experienced persons to be appointed to the Chinese Medicine Accreditation Committee (the Accreditation Committee).

The Accreditation Committee is established by the Board as the accreditation authority for Chinese medicine under the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law, as in force in each state and territory (the National Law).

The functions of the Accreditation Committee include:

- developing and reviewing accreditation standards
- assessing and monitoring programs of study
- advising the Board on issues in education and clinical training, and
- overseeing the assessment of the knowledge, clinical skills and professional attributes of overseasqualified Chinese medicine practitioners seeking registration in Australia.

Applications will be assessed by a selection advisory panel. Appointments are made by the Board under the National Law. Appointments may be for up to three years, with eligibility for reappointment, and are expected to start in mid-2016.

Applications close on Monday 2 May 2016.

If you employ registered health practitioners, you have an important obligation to ensure that they hold current registration and that you understand your mandatory notification requirements under the National Law.

AHPRA has published <u>resources</u> to help you understand and meet your obligations, which are designed to complement your recruitment requirements and processes. These materials state exactly what your obligations are and it is important that you are familiar with them.

<u>The Chinese Medicine Board of Australia</u> is the regulator of Chinese medicine practitioners in Australia and acts to protect the public by ensuring that suitably qualified and competent Chinese medicine practitioners are registered. The Board is responsible for developing registration standards, codes and guidelines for Chinese medicine practitioners and managing notifications (complaints)* about Chinese medicine practitioners and Chinese medicine students. The Board does this through its powers under the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law, as in force in each state and territory, and the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme, supported by the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA). The Board's work in regulating Australia's Chinese medicine practitioners in the public interest is underpinned by regulatory principles, which encourage a responsive, risk-based approach to regulation. *Except in NSW and Qld which have co-regulatory arrangements.
